# PASTOR'S CORNER

### Swimming With the Deeper Current

We "modern" people in 2015 often look puzzled when asked to deliberately choose Lenten penances that "give something up." that deprive us of some usual comfort or pleasure. And while we know that most of the things we give up for Lent, e.g. candy, sweets, movies, computer games, potato chips, alcoholic beverages, complaining, talking idly, noisiness, etc..., are actually *luxuries* for past generations, we still find it too difficult very often to go without these "normal" parts of our lives. It is important, however, that we do these little sacrifices of daily "taken-for-granted" things, so as to open ourselves to the radical teachings of Christ regarding dependence on the Father, forgiveness of others, repentance for our sins, and the love of enemies. These teachings are the deeper current, much deeper and stronger current than the tides in which we usually swim and drift.

The usual tides of our modern lives are busy-ness, consumerism, power/control, fear and security, pleasures of body/mind/spirit, entertainment. But underneath all this is the deeper current wherein the Lord pulls and draws a person-so-disposed to find Him in the midst of all the tides of life. Thomas Merton writes.

Many religious people, who say they love God, detest and fear the very thought of a poverty that is real enough to mean insecurity, hunger, dirt. And yet you will find those who go down and live among the poor not because they love God (in whom they do not believe) or even because they love the poor, but simply because they hate the rich and want to stir up the poor to hate the rich too. If people can suffer these things for the venomous pleasure of hatred, why do so few become poor out of love?

Bodily penances (sacrifices and discipline) are a necessary thing for the willing disciple, because they put us in touch with our real motives (our steering currents) in the waters of this life. Penances lay bare for us (who grow silent and still enough to see them) the reasons we do what we do, please whom we please, and seek what we seek. To swim with the deeper current is to learn to yield to the love of God and to love God and others full-heartedly in return. It's hard to believe, I know, that giving up candy or entertainment for Lent can be a doorway to the love of God. But, then again, we profess faith in a Crucified and Risen Lord! One must "give up" to make room for something, some ONE, more.

### LENTEN OBLIGATIONS

**Abstinence** from meat, including poultry, is observed on Ash Wednesday, all Fridays in Lent, and Good Friday for all Catholics 14 years of age and older.

Fasting is observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 59. Those bound by this rule may take only one full, meatless, meal a day. Two smaller, meatless, meals are permitted as necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted.

All Catholics are obliged to fulfill their **Easter Duty**. They are required to receive Holy Communion during the Easter Season, which is from the first Sunday of Lent, February 22<sup>nd</sup>, until Trinity Sunday, May 31<sup>st</sup>. Those conscious of serious sin are reminded of the obligation to confess their sins at least once a year during this time.

## **EWTN LENTEN FACTS**

The word "lent" means "lengthen" and stands for that time in spring when the days grow longer.

The **original period of Lent was 40 hours**. It was spent fasting to commemorate the suffering of Christ and the 40 hours He spent in the tomb. In the early 3rd century, Lent was lengthened to 6 days. About 800 AD it was changed to 40 days to commemorate the 40 days Christ spent in the wilderness.

Since Lent is a penitential season of preparation for Easter, the Stations of the Cross, which follow the path of Christ from Pontius Pilate's praetorium to Christ's tomb, have been a popular devotion. Tradition holds that our Blessed Mother visited daily the scenes of our Lord's passion.

After Constantine legalized Christianity in the year 312, the pathway of our Lord's passion was marked with its important stations. St. Jerome (342- 420), living in Bethlehem during the later part of his life, attested to the crowds of pilgrims from various countries who visited those holy places and followed the Way of the Cross.

In 1342, the Franciscans were appointed as guardians of the shrines of the Holy Land. In the 16th century, this pathway was officially entitled the "Via Dolorosa" (Sorrowful Way) or simply Way of the Cross or Stations of the Cross. When the Moslem Turks blocked the access to the Holy Land, reproductions of the Stations of the Cross were erected at popular spiritual centers.
