St Anthony Mary Zaccaria

Born in 1502 in Cremona, Italy, Anthony became a medical doctor. In 1528, he was ordained a priest. He devoted himself to works of charity and mercy, visiting and consoling the sick in hospitals and poor-prisons. The ministry of preaching and the administration of the sacraments produced such great fruit that St. Anthony was encouraged to seek a larger field for his labors and to carry out a great project which he had formed for the good of souls. Besides giving conferences in churches to ecclesiastics and lay people, he went into the streets of the city with crucifix in hand, and produced great fruit in souls by preaching on the Passion and Death of Christ and the need of penance for sin. St. Anthony cofounded the Barnabites, the religious congregation so called because it was headquartered in St. Barnabas Monastery in Milan. Anthony popularized the forty-hour prayer devotion, and he also revived the custom of ringing church bells at 3 p.m. on Fridays, in remembrance of the Crucifixion. In art, he is depicted wearing the black cassock of the order and holding a lily, crucifix, chalice and/or host. St. Anthony died on July 5, 1539, at the age of thirty seven. His body was found incorrupt 27 years after his death.

Saint Maria Goretti

Maria Goretti was born to poor farm laborers in Corinaldo, Italy, in 1890. Like Agnes, Lucy, and Agatha, virgin martyrs of the early Church, Maria willed to suffer death rather than the destruction of her purity. She was eleven when nineteen-year-old Alessandro Serenelli attacked her, intent on raping her. Even as she struggled in Alessandro's grasp, Maria begged him to consider the gravity of the sin he was about to commit. He stabbed her fourteen times. She died two days later after great suffering, freely forgiving her attacker.

At her beatification in 1947, her mother (then 82), two sisters and a brother appeared with Pope Pius XII on the balcony of St. Peter's. Three years later, at her canonization, a 66-year-old Alessandro Serenelli knelt among the quarter-million people present and cried tears of joy. Maria is the patronness of purity and protector of Catholic youth. *Magnificat, July, 2016*

Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati

Born in 1901 in Turin, Italy, his time on earth was short-only 24 years-but he filled it passionately with holy living. From the earliest age, and despite two unreligious parents, Pier Giorgio placed Christ first in all that he did. Pier Giorgio prayed daily, offering, among other prayers, a daily rosary on his knees by his bedside. Often his agnostic father would find him asleep in this position.

Pier Giorgio was handsome, vibrant, and natural. These attractive characteristics drew people to him. He had many good friends and he shared his faith with them with ease and openness. Pier Giorgio also loved sports. He was an avid outdoorsman and loved hiking, riding horses, skiing, and mountain climbing. He was never one to pass on playing a practical joke, either. He relished laughter and good humor.

When news of Pier Giorgio's death on July 4, 1925 reached the neighborhood and city, the Frassati parents, who had no idea about the generous self-donation of their young son, were astonished by the sight of thousands of people crowded outside their mansion on the day of their son's funeral Mass and burial. The poor, the lonely, and those who had been touched by Pier Giorgio's love and faithful example had come to pay homage to this luminous model of Christian living.

Pier Giorgio's mortal remains were found incorrupt in 1981 and were transferred from the family tomb in the cemetery of Pollone to the Cathedral of Turin.
